
Sept. Program

DR. MIKE ZIMMERMAN PRESENTS THE STORY OF "VASA"

Dr. Mike Zimmerman gave a presentation about the 64 gun Swedish war ship illustrated with personal photos taken on a recent trip. "Vasa," which sank in Stockholm harbor on August 10, 1628 on her maiden voyage, never left the harbor. After sailing no more than 1300 meters (less than a mile). Although her guns were salvaged in the 1660s, the wreck sat underwater for 333 years. Vasa was raised and broke the surface on April 4th 1961.

There was discussion with members about how the wood was preserved and deteriorating nails carefully replaced to keep the ship together. Dr. Zimmerman, a pathologist, showed pictures of and was asked to explain, skeletal remains (Filip the helmsman) found in the ship. His findings were published in the *Journal of Paleopathology* and also in his book "My Patients Were Mummies". This led to the discovery of a condition now known as osteochondritis dissecans or "Helmsman's Elbow", (leasions on the elbow) caused by the stress of operating the mechanism.

All in all great overview of the ship's history. The ship survived for two main reasons: the harbor was cold and the water brackish preventing the worms from eating the wood.



Club member Ron Spicer delivered a scratch built model of the submarine *Becuna*. Working from plans supplied by the museum, the model is 40 inches long and approximately 12 inches high- 1/96 scale. It will eventually be displayed along with *Olympia* and *Diligence*, also in 1/96 scale showing three phases of the growth of the U.S. Navy. They will represent the 3 full size ships that are a part of the museum.

BLOCK MAKING FOR THE MUSEUM OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The boat shop was asked to supply 4 blocks so that the canon could be run out for their visitors. Two were single, two were doubles. We made 5 more for the guns on Diligence.

We used oak for the sides, and turned mahogany for the sheaves.

The wood was milled to the needed thickness, and a groove was cut into the side for the iron frames.

The next step was to cut the outer edges to the outlined proper shape. To maintain a free spinning sheave, a spacer was glued top and bottom and a hole drilled for the gavel. The edges were rounded over by hand. The spacers were pinned by a brass rod on each side at the bottom. The irons were hand-forged by Jeffrey Huffenburger to the needed dimensions. He also made enough beckets (iron rings to tie off a line too, for the spares we made.

A shallow cut was made in each side of the blocks with a Forstner bit to hold a 2" brass circle, screwed in place to keep the shaft in place and the pieces were ready for stain and varnish. Joe Jordan, Charles Bernstein, regular volunteers and Jeffery Huffenberger, a staff member, worked on this project.

On September 9th PSMS joined the Coast Day festivities at the Seaport Museum. The weather was pleasant but windy. We had 6 tables set up behind the museum outside the boat shop with canopies and chairs. We were prepared for a fun float with RC models but the wind and water did not co-operate. The tide was out and the river bed grass was showing. Not good conditions for sailing. However, Steve Bulova braved the conditions and floated 3 boats on his own!





TIME RUNNING OUT ON BATTLESHIP TEXAS



Supporters of the Battleship Texas warn there isn't much time left to save the ship, a veteran of 2 world wars. The hull is becoming more and more difficult to patch. 300,000 gallons of water a day are pumped out of the ship. The best course of action , is to dry berth the ship, creating a system around the vessel allowing restorers to control the amount of water surrounding the hull. The cost of such a project is estimated at \$40 million.

The State of Texas owns the ship, currently berthed in the Houston Ship Channel.

Launched in 1912, Texas took part in Woodrow Wilson's intervention in Mexico, and during WWI, trained Naval Armed Guard gun crews, and protected troop convoys in the North Sea. In the Second World War, she participated in the battle of Iwo Jima and the Normandy invasion. Today she is the country's only remaining world War I - era dreadnought battleship.

Egyptian River Boat, Scratch built from National GeographicIllustration. Material-Wood, Scale 1/48

This was the first war scale wooden boat to travel on the Nile river. It had neither bracing ribs nor keel.

This ship had a two legged mast that could be lowered and a thick taut cable bound the bow to the stern. This cable reinforced the hull.

An impressive model complete with crew!




RON SPICER

SS Robalo Scale 1/240

Gato class submarine. Kit needed extensive modification. Changed the profile of the hull and scratch built the conning tower. Replaced the deck to meet scale. Scratch built hatches and anchor and anchor housing.

Launched on 9 May, 1943 - sunk by a mine July 26,1944 in the S. Chins Sea.

Built for a friend who lost an uncle on the boat.








LOE GUDONIS DIORAMA

U.S.Coast Guard stopping an Illegal "Rock 'n Roll radio operation in 1987. Back in 1980's, believe it or not, Rock and Roll music during that era was virtually banned by commercial radio stations. Disgruntled broadcasters transmitted from an offshore radio station.

The Coast Guard quickly raided and destroyed it without the authority to do so






JOE JORDAN

SS Hercules - San Francisco harbor tugboat Scale 1/144Circa 1906. Sister ship of the "Goliath and still a working museum steamship in San Francisco. Built in Camden, the 151 ft tugboat was sailed to San Francisco via the Straits of Magellan with her sister ship Golith in tow and towed barges of material to help build the Panama canal. Plans are available on the Hercules web site snd were enlarged for the 12 5/8" model. Joe explained the lift method of construction to develop the hull on the scratch built model. Joe's daughter lives near San Francisco and will send send pictures of the details on the ship.

SPENCE DELIN

Block Island boat - scratch built. Work in progress.

Scale 1/32. Double ender and double framed. The original boat is approximate 22 feet long and used for fishing purposes. Also known as a Block Island Cowhorn. Has pronounced sheer, is double ended, clinker built. Broad beam relative to length and has interior planking (ceiling) planking. Carved from a wood block, Spence described his method of keeping the 1/16th inch bulwarks the same thickness. Drill into the wood 1/16th of an inch with a small drill. The holes are revealed as you carve. The exterior planking will cover the holes.





EDD LEAF

Sabino: Steamboat - scratch built. 100% complete. Tulle (bridle veil material) was used for open railing work. Scale 1/8 Sabino is the oldest wooden, coal fired working steamboat in regular operation in the U.S. Built in 1908 in east Boothbay, Maine, she spent most of her career ferrying passengers and cargo between Maine towns and islands. Sabino was purchased by Mystic Seaport Museum in 1974 to serve as a working exhibit. She is still powered by the 2 cylinder Paine compound steam engine installed in 1908. Beautiful little model.



Mike and Bobbie Zimmerman were on a transatlantic crossing of the QM2 in August. There were 7 WWII vets on board ages 91 to 97 years old, who talked about their experiences, where they were then the war ended and how their mothers said "I never expected to see you again ". They were sponsored by the Greatest Generation Foundation, which takes WWII vets back to German and Japanese battle sites. "Meeting and talking to them was a great experience for us." BATTLESHIP NEW JERSEY MUSEUM DISPLAY

Dennis Levitt and Tom Gilchrist displayed a newly donated model of the ship. 1/96 scale, 9'3" long. Radio controlled by a 7 channel radio. Built by R. Quinlan in 7 1/2 months in 1981. Weight 75 lbs. All 4 props rotate, twin rudder steer the ship, port anchor raises and lowers, radar antenna rotates, strobe lights on after superstructure, port and starboard running lights, helicopter with rotating blades, stern crane rotates, Main gun turrets rotate, elevate and fire, smoke emits from stacks, installed sound system. Materials: Hull-fiberglass, superstructure - boxwood and plastic, weapons - brass and bronze. The museum plans to install it in a river pond as an attraction for public participation.








FRED SIGNOR
