PAT LEAF LITERALLY SERVES UP "ROYAL NAVY FOOD at the time of the NAPOLEONIC WARS"



Our guest speaker was our own Pat Leaf who presented an illustrated talk about dining in the 1700/1800 Royal Navy ships- galley and stove- typical servings and descriptions covering food handling. Conditions improved according to rank. Midshipmen's situation was better than regular mess group and officers had the Ward room. Captains dined alone (unless he had invited guests) and brought their own food on board. Fresh meat-chickens, goats and pigs were kept on board and fresh vegetables were had in port.

Interesting facts: Square meals- plates were square. Gold earring- used to pay for funerals. The mess cook served with his back to the sailors so that no preference was shown. Extra rations were given to sick or injured sailors.

Daily rum rations caused many cases of drunkenness. Several issues were associated with this: Discipline and a high degree of injuries. In 1972 rum rations ceased (ships became very technical).

Examples of the food were prepared by Pat and served during the break: Lobscause - corned beef, ham and potatoes, Salomcumy - chefs salad and Trifle - fruit layered with custard. Thank you Pat for a fine presentation.

Guest Visitor Craig Bruns, Chief Curator at the Seaport museum discussed the most recent projects such as the new **Makers Space** that replaced the store and souvenir shop on the main floor of the museum. It will be devoted to development and instruction of **STEAM** based education programs (Education, Science, Technology, Engineering, Math and Art) to the public using hands-on interactive learning.

Craig also spoke about a sailing, racing sneak box, 10 to 12 foot long flat bottomed boat, destined for scrapping. 3D photography was used to create documentation from which a virtual model and plans could be made.

The museum is looking for a PSMS club member volunteer to build a scale model of the sneak box racer.




TITANIC WRECK TO BE LAZER SCANNED!

OceanGate Inc., a provider of manned submersible services and 2G Robotics, a global leader in underwater laser scanners, have formed a strategic alliance to capture laser data of the RMS *Titanic* shipwreck and debris field. 2G Robotics dynamic underwater laser scanner, the ULS-500 PRO, will be installed on OceanGate"s *Cyclops 2*, the first manned submersible to survey the Titanic since 2005.

The six week Titanic Survey ExpeditionWill depart from St John's, Newfoundland in June with scientists, content experts, mission specialists joining the crew in a series of week-long missions. The 2G Robotics equipment will generate realtime 3D models with millimetric resolution. Using the highly accurate laser data, the team will overlay 4K images captured throughout the expedition and create a detailed 3D virtual model of the wreck. This model will serve as an objective baseline to assess the decay of the wreck over time and help to document and preserve its submerged history.

Cyclops 2 underwater laser scanner is quicker and delivers fine-scans dimensional features not captured by other methods documenting the debris field and creating a nearly lifelike digital model without disrupting habitat.



The Seaport Museum has chosen PSMS to represent ship modeling to the public. We are one of the few exhibits that can respond when asked a question (one other being the boat shop). 



THE BOUNTY The True Story of the Mutiny on the Bounty

More than two centuries after Master's Mate Fletcher Christian led a mutiny against Lieutenant William Bligh on a small armed transport vessel called Bounty. The true story of this enthralling adventure has become obscured by legends. Combining vivid characterization and deft storytelling, Caroline Alexander shatters the centuries-old myths surrounding this story. She brilliantly shows how, in a desperate attempt to save one man from the gallows and another from ignominy, two powerful families came together and began to create the version of history we know today. The true story of the Mutiny on the Bounty is an epic of duty and heroism, pride and power, and the assassination of a brave man's honor at the dawn of the romantic age.



Joe Rochefort's War: The Odyssey of the Codebreaker who outwitted Yamamoto at Midway

Elliot Carlson's award winning biography of Captain Joe Rochefort is the first to be written about the officer who headed station Hypo, the U,S Navy's signals monitoring and cryptographic intelligence unit at Pearl Harbor, and who broke the Japanese navy's code before the battle of Midway. The book brings Rochefort to life as an irreverent, fiercely independent, and consequential officer that he was. Readers share his frustrations he searches in vain for Yamamoto's fleet prior to the attack on Pearl Harbor, but share his joy when he succeeds in tracking the fleet in early 1942 and breaks the code that leads Rochefort to believe Yamamoto's target is Midway. His conclusions, bitterly opposed by some top Navy brass, are credited with making the U.S. victory possible and helping to change the course of the war. opponents in Washington forced Roche fort's removal from station Hypo and denied him the Distinguished Medal recommended by Admiral Nimitz.

Gannet 15cc 1 cylinder, 4 stroke motor w/ magneto, external push rods & valves. often used in Sea Queen- British large cabin cruiser. Aluminum & steel. Circa 1960's.





Joe also showed the now completed HERCULES - 1906 ocean tug built in Camden N.J. Scratch built using bread and butter technique. Basswood with brass railings. All parts except vents are hand made.

The name on the base was hand-carved with a #11 Exacto blade and the base finished with 5-6 coats of polyurethane.

Mike showed 2 work-inprogress, scratch built models. The USS WAMPANOAG, A Union Commerce raider. 4200 tons, 355' long x 45' wide. 25% complete, will have 10 9" Dahlgren cannon Scale 1/192.



The CSS HUNLEY, a Confederate submarine. 25% complete. Sunk the Union blockade ship HOUSATONIC HUNLEY most likely damaged by the blast, sank. Recovered in 1995 of Sullivan's Island in Charleston harbor Scale 1/35





FRANCINE SERRATORE

Francine brought the USS SHAW, a MAHAN class destroyer built at the Philadelphia Navy Yard. The model is 74% complete. She used mostly balsa and plywood along with plastic and resin parts. Scale 1/96.. Along with her sister ship CASSIN, SHAW was severely damaged at Pearl Harbor. The famous photo of her blowing up in dry dock makes you wonder how the ship was saved. After repairs SHAW returned to the war in 1942 and participated in the Battle of Santa Cruz and many other battles. She was scrapped in 1947.



"SEA HUNTER", A DRONE SHIP WITH NO CREW, JUST JOINED THE U.S. NAVY



A prototype autonomous ship known as the Medium Displacement Unmanned Surface Vehicle (MDUSV) has officially been transferred to the U.S. Navy from the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA after a 2 year testing and evaluation program. Named "Seahunter," The Office of Naval Research will continue to develop the vessel from this point forward.



NEW WIND DRIVEN CONCEPT



Pioneering Ducth company Fair Transport has operated its shipping business using only sail-driven vessels since 2009. Now ship owners are looking into wind assisted ship propulsion, with some designs offering realistic potential fuel savings and green operation. A European project group has selected a hybrid Flettner ship concept as most realistic wind power for commercial shipping.

Flettner rotors upon the deck of a freighter offer the best model for wind assisted propulsion on the market today. A commercial vessel that gets forward thrust from Flettner rotors in audition to conventional propulsion is the most likely to succeed in Northern European short sea shipping trade.

The total surface of four Flettner rotors is still less than the total surface of a sailing rig, but this set-up also causes less heel in the wind and is not as much of an obstacle when loading and unloading the ship.

12th CHESAPEAKE BAY MARITIME MUSEUM MODEL EXPO

SATURDAY MAY 19TH AND SUNDAY MAY 20TH 2018 ST . MICHAELS, MARYLAND

The model activities will be on the museum grounds and in the Steamboat Building.

Throughout the two-day event, in a large 40' x 70' x 12" temporary fresh water pool, radio controlled live-steam steamboat models will puff-puff through a buoyed obstacle course, electric boats will glide by, and small sail boats will heel to the breeze.

Impressively large R - C sail boats will race and demonstrate their agility, while large R - C power boats will throw a wake in Fogg's Cove on the Museum's waterfront. On Sunday CBMM's Model Sailing Club will race five-foot R - C skipjack models along CBMM's Fogg's Cove shore.

In the Steamboat Building, Van Lennep Auditorium, members of the Washington Ship Model Society and other highly acclaimed molders from throughout the region will show and discuss their carefully researched and crafted vessels and demonstrate building techniques.

Children will have the opportunity to build, paint, decorate, and then sail their own small model in a small pool. For \$3.00 they can select and build a sailboat or rubber band powerboat assisted by a CBMM Model Guild Member.

On Saturday the two-day event is open to the public with general admission. Admission is free for CBMM members.. On Sunday the Museum will celebrate Community Day when the entire 18-acre waterfront campus and 12 exhibit buildings will be open to all free of charge.

Exhibitor registration and admission is free. Admission is free to participant's guest and children. 8ft table and two chairs rental is \$15 outside. 6ft tables and chairs are free in the auditorium.
