

Parking - a reminder








MODEL COMMISSION FROM THE BATTLESHIP NEW JERSEY

There is **no charge** for table space. Tables and burlap covers are provided or use you own.




CODE GIRLS

The untold story of the American Women Code Breakers of World War II

By Lisa Mundy

The Maritime Archaeology of San Francisco's Waterfront Described as a "forrest of masts", San Francisco's waterfront was a floating economy of ships and wharves, where a dazzling array of global goods was traded and transported. Drawing on excavations in buried ships and collapsed buildings from this period, James P. Delgado re-creates San Francisco's unique maritime landscape, shedding new light on the city's remarkable rise from a village to a boomtown of thousands in three short years from 1848 to 1851. AMERICAN SCOUT 1946

A 50 year old post WWII Sterling kit. Scale 1:100. 50" long. 80% finished. Radio controlled. Materials: Balsa, Basswood and brass. Poor quality lead fittings and most wood had to be replaced. All deck sections are removable and the anchor will be movable. The gloss finish on the hull is excellent. His comments? " Never again".

HMY BRITTANIA

Scratch built, Scale 1/350 Pleasure/yatch 1953 to present. Now a museum ship in Leith Scotland. Materials: wood, plastic, and photo paper. Mike liked the challenge of building from photos and used photo paper images for details like windows and portholes.

He enjoyed planking the deck very much and then realized he had to cover most of it with cabins and superstructure.

NS SAVANNAH - A NUCLEAR POWERED PASSENGER CARGO SHIP



The Philadelphia Navy Yard is being considered as a mothball port for the *NS Savannah* (presently in Baltimore). She will have the last of her nuclear shielding taken out and may be officially turned into a museum. At this time Philly is in the running (one of 5 ports being considered) but has not been selected.

NS Savannah was one of only three nuclear powered cargo ships ever built (others being NS Otto Hahn and the Russian container ship Sevmorput).

First proposed in 1955 and built in 1969, she was part of President Eisenhower's "Atoms for Peace" initiative.





Shipwreck may solve 250-year old mystery this month.

It's Australia's most historic ship, but the mystery of where Capt. Cook's Endeavour lies has been shrouded in secrecy for centuries.

As the 250th anniversary approaches of the famed explorer's departure on the Endeavour from Plymouth on Aug. 25th, 1768 to claim this country for England, the mystery may be about to be solved.

On a muddy floor off Rhode Island, the ship is believed to be among 13 ships scuttled in Newport harbor by the British in 1778.

Kathy Abbass of the Rhode Island Marine Archaeology Project, has led investigations into the fortunes of Endeavour.

Bought by an English private owner and renamed Lord Sandwich, she carried British troops to the U.S. in the Revolutionary war. She then became a prison ship in Newport Harbor. When Abbass was researching the 13 scuttled ships in a blockade of Narragansett Bay to protect Newport from the French Fleet, she found a document that said the Lord Sandwich was Cook's Endeavour. It said there were five to the northwest of Goat Island and that Lord Sandwich was one of them.

Divers will have to look for Endeavours distinguishing features which are its length, broad flat bow, square stern, and long boxlike body. Larger than those among which it was scuttled.

If we find all five ships, and the other ships are much smaller, then it's likely that we've found her Abbass said.

The Secret Language of Ships



Are these bird cubbies, rusting in the sea air? Not quite. The cavities are, however, known as pigeon holes. They'er part of an in hull ladder the allows mariners to climb up the side of a barge. Unlike cargo ships, flat-bottomed barges are not self- propelled. They'er usually towed or pushed by tugboats, though in the early days they were usually hauled up rivers and canals by horses, mules or donkeys on an adjacent towpath. Though barges are usually unstaffed, they occasionally have to be boarded, for instance when a line needs to be thrown to a dock worker. Pigeon holes give the boarders a leg up.
