Changes to the Constitution

At the last meeting, it was discovered that PSMS does not have a budget process for dispersant of funds. Steve Bulova will do a budget for 2020. Remember, a budgets a projection and we can't predict the future. but based on prior years, we should have a handle on most expenses and income.

There have been couple of incidents that show we are out of control on spending of PSMS funds:

- 1) a member paid for North East conference even though it is not our year to host. Steve is working on getting reimbursement of funds from our hosting Club
- 2) The cost of the 2018 holiday party was \$200 over what was expected and no one knows the reason. I know there were several no-shows- which must be addressed. We need to have a drop dead date for giving a count and people who have not paid should not be in the count. Also we have paid for guest that were no-shows let's make sure they go or not invite.
- 3) Flyers were printed for the club without adequate review of the leadership or PSMS membership with no competitive bidding. This has resulted in the contact being a person who has not been at a meeting for at least three years. It also gives his address, telephone number and email.

Part of what Josh is doing it Is to make the website our contact point. The PSMS website and email address should be on the flyers. Josh also wants other executive board members to have the password, so that it can be monitored.

In light of two known incidents, I want to share the NPS (North Penn S Gaugers) bylaws:

No expenditure over \$25 without membership approval (unless a budgeted item).

I propose the following:

No expenditure over \$50 without for executive committee members of approval.

No expenditure over \$200 without PSMS membership approval.

All flyers to be reprinted must be brought to the executive committee for review and if deemed necessary, the PSMS membership.

There should be competitive bidding on purchases (which can be done by individual members, many of whom have contacts).







"Started with freshman skills in 1975, now redoing poor workmanship".


Too late to do it the first time. The ship still operates. Summer in Portland, Winters, south (Cuba, Bahamas).



One of the worst warships ever built!

Russian monitor Novgorod

Novgorod was a monitor built for the Imperial Russian Navy in the 1870s. She was one of the most unusual warships ever constructed, and still survives in popular myth as one of the worst warships ever built. The hull was circular to reduce draft while allowing the ship to carry much more armor and a heavier armament than other ships of the same size.

The idea of a circular battleship emerged in a 1868 report published by Scottish ship builder John Elder that advocated widening the beam of a ship would reduce the area that needed to be protected and allow it to carry thicker amour and heavier, more powerful guns in comparison to a ship with narrow beam, as was typical practice of the day. Also, such a ship would have a shallower draft and only a moderate increase in power would be required to match the speed of a normal ship.

Sir Edward Reed, then director of Naval Construction of the Royal Navy agreed with him.

Rear Adm. Andrei Alexandrovich Popov of the Imperial Russian Navy further expanded on Elders concept by broadening the ship so that it was actually circular and he made the design flat bottomed to minimize its draft.

Then pressed home the Construction..

The design revolved around a shallow draft vessel capable of traversing low level waters such as rivers and lakes, giving it access to more battlefronts than traditional warships could ever reach. The end result became one of the most panned warships ever completed. It's circular hull did not allow for the expected armoring and ornament benefits and it suffered from stability in anything other than calm waters and accuracy of its main armament was left wanting.

Originally *Novgorod* was developed along the lines of a monitor ironclad. Her dimensions included a length of 101 feet with a beam equaling that, while her draft was just 13.5 ft. Displacement was 2,500 tons and power was from six compound-expansion steam engines fed by eight boilers- all this driving six shafts (the outboard pair were removed in 1876-77 due to their minimal propulsion benefits). At best, the ship could hope to make upwards of 6.5 knots in ideal conditions.

Two smoke funnels were fitted along the sides of the circular shape with the main armament, 2 x 11" (280mm) guns sited dead center). While rifled, they remained muzzle loading weapons. The guns traversed on a a rotating turntable and could be fired jointly or individually. But in other respects the ship was considered a dismal failure. It was too slow to stem the current in the Dniepr, and proved very difficult to steer. In practice the discharge of even one gun caused it to turn out of control and even contra-rotating some of six propellers, was unable to keep the ship on the correct heading. Nor could it cope with rough weather which is frequently encountered in the Black Sea. It was prone to rapid rolling and pitching in anything more than a flat calm and could not aim or load its guns under such circumstances Norgorod's first and only call to arms



came during the Russo-Turkish war (1877-78) where she was stationed at Odessa to act as a deterrent. In 1892 she was re-designated "coastal defense ironclad". Struck from the Naval register in July, 1903 and used as stores ship until she was sold for scrap in 1911.
