
AUGUST PSMS MEETING

Ed Leaf's 90th Birthday

Celebrated model builder, Vietnam veteran, author, retired Society Treasurer emeritus and past President, Ed Leaf, will be celebrating his 90th birthday on July 26th.

A member of the Society since 1986, Ed has been a prolific model builder for museums and private clients including the Haerr Museet in Oslo, Norway. Models in the Philadelphia Seaport Museum are the Normandie, the Algerian Xebec, which is the frontispiece of the Patriots and Pirates exhibit and the USS Pennsylvania, 1837, in the back of the exhibit. Ed also has models on the Battleship New Jersey (which he saw in action in Vietnam). They are USS. Kearsarge, BB5, Italian battle- ship Roma, HMS Dreadnaught, USS New Jersey BB16, French battleship Jean Bart, and the Italian battleship Dante Alighieri. Ed's models are all scratch built.



In addition to authoring a book "Ship Modeling From Scratch", Ed paints, sculpts - mostly 16"/1' scale, and plays several musical instruments including violin and base recorder. From everyone in the Philadelphia Ship Model Society



His final completion thus far is the USS Missouri. A Revell plastic kit. Scale 1/535.

Everyone knows the history "Mighty Mo". In the movie "Battleship", the USS Missouri saves the planet from Alien attack".





paint to create the water texture, several coats of navy blue paint and a final coat of clear blue. The minimum use of the bow wave is very effective. "Built as a birthday present for my friend Harris. His college room mate became a Navy admiral and got Harris a flight and landing on the Kitty Hawk."

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

A NEW HISTORY OF YACHTING by Mike Bender


This book by a leading expert in the field, is the first history of yachting for over a quarter of a century. Setting developments within political, social and economic changes, the book tells the story of yachting from Elizabethan times to the present day: The first uses of yachts by monarchs, especially Charles II; yacht clubs and yacht racing in the 18th century; the early years of the Royal Yacht Squadron at Cowes and an analysis of the America Cup Challenges; the pioneering developments in Ireland and the exporting of yachting to the colonies and trading outposts of the Empire; the expansion of yachting in Victorian times; the Golden age of yachting in the years before the First World war, when it was the sport of the crowned heads of Europe; the invention of the dingy and the keel boat classes and, after the Second World war, the massive numbers of home built dinghies, the breaking of new boundaries by risk-taking single-handers from the mid-1960's; the expansion of leisure sailing that came in the 1980s with the use of molded plastic yachts; the current trends and pressures within the sport and the sailing enthusiast.

Mike Bender is an experienced yachtsman and a qualified Ocean Yachtmaster, with some 40,000 miles mostly singlehanded, under the keel. He is an honorary research fellow in history at the University of Exeter

THE WRECK OF THE PORTLAND: A Doomed Ship, a Violent Storm, and New England's Worst Maritime Disaster By J, North Conway

The SS Portland was one of New England's largest and most luxurious paddle steamers and its loss in 1898 in a violent storm with some 200 people aboard was later remembered as "New England's Titanic".

After nine years of solid performance, she earned a reputation as a safe and dependable vessel. In November 1898, a perfect storm formed off the New England coast. Conditions would produce a blizzard with 100 miles per hour winds and 60 foot waves that pummeled the coast. At the time, there was no radio communication between ships and shore, no radar to navigate by, and no sophisticated weather forecasting capacity. The SS Portland, a side-wheel steamer furnished with chandeliers, red velvet carpets and fine china, was carrying more than 200 passengers from Boston to Portland Maine, over Thanksgiving weekend when it ran headlong into a monstrous, violent gale off Cape Cod. It was never seen again. All passenger and crew were lost at sea. More than half the crew were African Americans from Portland. Their deaths decimated the Maine African



American community. The storm was one of the worst ever recorded in New England waters. Now known as the "Portland Gale", killed 400 people along the coast and sent more than 200 ships to the bottom, including the doomed Portland. To this day, it is not known exactly how many passengers were aboard or even who many of them were. The only passenger list was aboard the vessel. As a result of this tragedy, ships would thereafter leave a passenger manifest ashore.

The disaster has been blamed on the hubris of the captain of the Portland, Hollis Blanchard, who decided to leave the safety of Boston Harbor despite knowing that a severe storm was hurtling up the coast.

Author J. North Conway has created a personal, visceral account of the sinking and the times and the people involved, with stories to bring readers on to the Portland that day. Using painstaking recreated events, using first-hand sources and testimonials to weave a can't-put-it-down narrative in the tradition of Erik Larson's Isaac's Storm and Walter Lord's enduring classic, A night to remember.

PIRATES OF THE MODEL SHIP WORLD

Model Ship World, the forum of the National Research Guild has published this list, shown below, of known kit manufacturers that steal and duplicate kits from reputable manufacturers. This is called "PIRATING". These companies are known to have pirated either plans or designs from another source in order to profit from the original author's work...stolen really.

Chuck Passaro, of Syren Ship Model Company and Administrator NRG's Model Ship world has written, "Many of you may be aware that there are some kit manufacturers that have been banned from Model Ship World. These are mostly Chinese companies that rip off and duplicate other kits from reputable manufacturers. We don't want to support such thievery. I have been personally ripped off by ZHL. They stole my Confederacy plans and actually include them in their kit. It's an awful kit to boot!"

Here is a list of companies that rip off and duplicate kits from reputable manufacturers.

JD Model LHQK Huasong Shi Cheng woodenkit (Russian Mfg) YengFan ZHL RealTS Snail Model XinFeng Crown Unicorn Model.

YQ (YaungQihg) Master CN CF ship hai 4H Model Moxing Microcosm WN SC DUJIAOSHOU

These include all of those kits everyone rationalizes in their head are not stolen but actually are.....like the ZHL Royal Caroline and Inderlandman kits. As well as many others. The plans and building patterns for every aspect of those two projects were stolen from the same master builder in Russia. He made the mistake of posting them on line for all to see just like so many do on model Ship World in their build logs and drafting forums (ie Triton). And they were almost immediately stolen. So you may not find a manufacturer who made the kit, but I can find

As many of you know Syren Ship Model Company takes the issue of pirating ship model kits, books and plans very seriously. There are many who embrace the purchase pirated materials for many reasons and are unfazed by the effect it has on our hobby and the honest mom and pop businesses that serve it.



I have just found out that the ships of scale model forum has now invited the very owners of these Chinese companies who have pirated from many companies you guys know very well.... they have pirated from Caldercraft, A.Latina, Ancre, Amati, Constructo, Panart and even me (Syren). The owners and administrators of the Ships of Scale forum are trying anything in their power to increase their tiny and pitiful content. So they are using the forum platform to promote everything Chinese and everything pirated. This is having a huge negative impact on the legitimate hobby.

PLEASE BOYCOTT the Ships of Scale forum and spread the word to all you know who might not be aware that they are a platform and public relations promoter of those that steal from the honest working ship model companies.
