





Mike submitted a U.S. Navy LST circa WWII, an ad hoc aircraft carrier for 8 Piper Cubs. These planes were launched off shore during an invasion as soon as airfields had been secured. These aircraft were invaluable to the invading forces and performed various tasks beyond spotting enemy positions. They resupplied troops in rugged terrain, evacuated wounded in remote areas, and in Leyte, in the Philippines, they were used to drop personal into rugged mountain terrain.

His model also shows how the navy modified the LST's with a "runway". These aircraft could not return to the ship and had to land on inland prepared landing strips or grass fields.

The LST had pontoons on the sides of the hull used for creating floating docks for trucks and tanks and any other wheeled vehicles. Attached to the bow, they became an extension of the ship's ramp to the shore. Mike fabricated the "runway" superstructure, 8 aircraft and the causeway sections to create this beautiful little model.



BATTLESHIPS YAMATO AND MUSASH Complete with more than 1020 scale drawings and 350 color 3D views By Janusz and Stefan Draminski Published by Bloomsbury

Equipped with the largest guns and heaviest armour and with the greatest displacement of any ship ever built, the Yamato proved to be a formidable opponent to the US Pacific Fleet in the Second World War. The book contains a full description of the design and construction of the battleship including wartime modifications, and a career history followed by a substantial pictorial section with rare onboard views of Yamato and her sister ship Musashi, a comprehensive portfolio of more than 1,020 perspective line artworks, 350 colour 3D views, and 30 photographs. The wreck of Musashi has been recently discovered to great excitement in Japan, renewing interest in these iconic warships.

Lindblad Expeditions' Second Polar Ship Christened

Lindblad Expeditions announced the launch of its second new polar vessel, National Geographic Resolution, on her inaugural voyage to Antarctica, South Georgia and the Falklands. Under Antarctica's clear blue skies and parked on fast ice in the Weddell Sea's Duse Bay, guests walked onto the ice to cheer on Captain Heidi Norling as she christened the 126-guest National Geographic Resolution.

"I wish this ship calm winds, fair seas, and great adventures. May everyone who sails with her be blessed," marked Captain Norling as she tossed the bottle. Following some remarks from Captain Martin Graser, guests, staff, and crew celebrated with a champagne toast in the time-honored tradition - with Adélie and gentoo penguins watching close by.

The vessel is Lindblad Expeditions' second polar new build in the company's history—and their second vessel to launch in 2021. Both are in Antarctica for the season.

"Seeing both of our new ships together in Ushuaia was very touching," said Sven Lindblad, Founder and Co-Chair of the Board, who just completed the inaugural Antarctica voyage of National Geographic Endurance. "They are extraordinary ships. We had very high expectations when we were building them — and their performance has far exceeded them."

Named to honor the first ship to cross the Antarctic Circle in 1773—navigated by the legendary Captain James Cook— National Geographic Resolution is fully stabilized and features the patented Ulstein X-Bow technology for a smoother, more comfortable ride in all kinds of conditions, and will enable guests to go where few have or can deeper into the polar regions.

"There is over 1,000 years of combined team expertise that go into a moment like this, and what an amazing team it is. We are so proud of everyone that worked tirelessly to create this extraordinary ship," said Dolf Berle, CEO, Lindblad Expeditions.

Following her season in Antarctica, National Geographic Resolution will make her debut in Europe this spring. She will navigate from Portugal to France and Scotland to Norway in style. After a summer in the Arctic, National Geographic Resolution will return to Antarctica via Japan and the East China Sea, and the remote Pacific Islands.

PIRATES OF THE MODEL SHIP WORLD

Model Ship World, the forum of the National Research Guild has published this list, shown below, of known kit manufacturers that steal and duplicate kits from reputable manufacturers. This is called "PIRATING". These companies are known to have pirated either plans or designs from another source in order to profit from the original author's work...stolen really.

Chuck Passaro, of Syren Ship Model Company and Administrator NRG's Model Ship world has written, "Many of you may be aware that there are some kit manufacturers that have been banned from Model Ship World. These are mostly Chinese companies that rip off and duplicate other kits from reputable manufacturers. We don't want to support such thievery. I have been personally ripped off by ZHL. They stole my Confederacy plans and actually include them in their kit. It's an awful kit to boot!"

These include all of those kits everyone rationalizes in their head are not stolen but actually are.....like the ZHL Royal Caroline and Inderlandman kits. As well as many others. The plans and building patterns for every aspect of those two projects were stolen from the same master builder in Russia. He made the mistake of posting them on line for all to see just like so many do on model Ship World in their build logs and drafting forums (ie Triton). And they were almost immediately stolen.

As many of you know Syren Ship Model Company takes the issue of pirating ship model kits, books and plans very seriously. There are many who embrace the purchase pirated materials for many reasons and are unfazed by the effect it has on our hobby and the honest mom and pop businesses that serve it.



I have just found out that the ships of scale model forum has now invited the very owners of these Chinese companies who have pirated from many companies you guys know very well.... they have pirated from Caldercraft, A.Latina, Ancre, Amati, Constructo, Panart and even me (Syren). The owners and administrators of the Ships of Scale forum are trying anything in their power to increase their tiny and pitiful content. So they are using the forum platform to promote everything Chinese and everything pirated. This is having a huge negative impact on the legitimate hobby.

PLEASE BOYCOTT the Ships of Scale forum and spread the word to all you know who might not be aware that they are a platform and public relations promoter of those that steal from the honest working ship model companies.
